2025 BHS Annual Report—Executive Summary

2025 was the first full year of a new beginning for the Bartlett Historical Society marked by the opening of our museum in late 2024. Where, in 2024, we transitioned our organization into our renovated museum building, in 2025, we moved the organization to new heights, fully utilizing our museum and headquarters as the centerpiece of BHS. All our BHS activities and events were held in the museum. We welcomed nearly 300 visitors to explore our museum exhibits. We also expanded our volunteer program. BHS was also recognized at the state level for our preservation achievement with our museum building. All-in-all, 2025 was a great year for the organization.

Leadership Team: We welcomed two new BHS Board members, both with business and non-profit experience. Buzz Query and John Chanley have added new positive dimensions to the BHS Board of Directors.

Membership: Our 2025 membership numbers were down by 15 members from our 2024 membership numbers. Reasons for the drop in growth include the deaths of several long-time members and the usual annual attrition that was not overcome with an influx of new members. This is an area where the BHS Board will explore ways to attract new members.

Financial: BHS closed 2025 in a strong financial position. In 2025, we combined the remaining funds from our museum renovation account into our existing General Fund account. We moved all our funds to a local bank. We also defined four sub-categories for our funds for better management of our financial assets - Operations Fund, Maintenance Reserve, Collection and Preservation Reserve, and Endowment Fund.

Fundraising: We placed a strong emphasis on fundraising to maintain our positive asset level. BHS was very fortunate to receive a sizable donation from a local charitable gaming casino. We also were hosted by two local restaurants for dining benefit events. Donations from presentation attendees and museum visitors were strong. Donations from BHS members over and above their annual membership dues were extremely positive as well.

Volunteers: Through 2025, BHS engaged about 24 volunteers in different tasks, all supporting the mission of BHS. Volunteer help eased work requirements of the BHS Board and provided a reason for people to feel involved in their historical society.

Activities and Events: Throughout the year, we hosted our usual Quarterly Presentation Series talks, two special presentations on our local railroad history, and an interactive workshop on researching the history of old houses. BHS taught a class on the history of Livermore to the 6th grade at Rivendell Academy in Orford, NH. This was followed by a BHS led site visit to Livermore. These, as well as several other events, kept the organization “in the news” throughout the year.

Recognition: BHS was honored by the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance (NHPA) with one of their 2025 Preservation Achievement Awards for our efforts to renovate and adapt the former St. Joseph Church into the Bartlett Historical Society and Museum. This brought BHS state-wide recognition.

Partnerships: BHS partnered with the Saco Valley Gem and Mineral Club to establish the geological history exhibit in July 2025. BHS also partnered with the Conway Scenic Railroad in their celebration of the 150th anniversary of the laying of the tracks and first train through Crawford Notch.

Conclusion: In 2025, BHS moved forward with many initiatives that brought a spotlight on the organization and, as a result, brought more community members into the organization. People from near and far stopped into explore the museum leaving very positive comments in the Guest Book. Donations of historically relevant artifacts increased. Most important, however, is the fact that BHS has earned a defined place in the local community and will continue to contribute to our community spirit. We look forward to an even better 2026.

President's Message



2025 marked another very positive year for the Bartlett Historical Society. Looking across the historical and administrative functions of our organization, we find ourselves well positioned to continue to carry out our mission of discovering, preserving, and sharing the history of Bartlett, Hart's Location, and Livermore. Having our museum and headquarters established for the past year, our concerns about where to meet and how to display our artifacts have been eliminated. I am very pleased with the direction being set by our Board of Directors and look forward to a bright tomorrow in 2026.

In our 2025 newsletters, I often made the comment that "we continue to be very busy here at the Bartlett Historical Society." A review of the activities undertaken behind the scenes and open to the public shows that each month BHS staff and volunteers were doing things that aligned with our Mission as a historical society. We are working with the community in mind as we research different aspects of our local history and as we offer opportunities for anyone who is interested in local history to learn about past events, places, and most importantly, people who made our three in-scope towns what they are today. Still, we need to remember that we are a non-profit business that needs to continually engage in fundraising to support the real costs of doing business. To that point, we are extremely grateful for the donations received from our members, local businesses, and foundations as their support literally helps keep BHS in business.

The Bartlett Historical Society, its Board of Directors, Volunteers, and members, have a great deal to be proud of as we look back on 2025. Here are just a few of the highlights:

- ⇒ The BHS leadership team was strengthened with the addition of two Board members, both well qualified to help lead the organization with business, non-profit, and leadership experience
- ⇒ With the museum in place, BHS received many donations of historically relevant artifacts and documents that we will preserve, use in our historical research, and provide access to for others to learn about the stories of our past
- ⇒ Our Annual Quarterly Presentation Series hosted four very interesting presenters covering local and regional topics; all our presentations were well attended with positive feedback from audience members
- ⇒ In partnership with the Saco Valley Gem and Mineral Club, we introduced a unique museum exhibit that took a different look at our local history, focusing on the geological history of the area
- ⇒ In partnership with the Conway Scenic Railroad, we participated in their celebration of the 150th anniversary of the laying of the rail tracks and first train to traverse Crawford Notch by hosting two special presentations focused on local railroad history and expanding our railroad exhibit
- ⇒ Looking for a way to engage members in a different learning process, BHS hosted our first interactive workshop where a presenter offered his expertise while addressing questions from the audience
- ⇒ Our museum exhibits were updated and changed with an opening of the new exhibits on July 4th in conjunction with the Bartlett Hellen Hayes Fourth of July Parade
- ⇒ BHS received state-wide recognition as the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance awarded BHS one of their ten 2025 Preservation Achievement Awards
- ⇒ BHS fundraising efforts proved to be very positive in 2025 with many donations from members, foundations, and charitable gaming donations contributing to our cause
- ⇒ BHS staff was able to assist several people in genealogical research as well as in the discovery of historical data for other independent research projects
- ⇒ The BHS Volunteer Program had a great jump start with 18 volunteers helping in a variety of different tasks and projects throughout the year
- ⇒ BHS was featured in two feature articles in the Conway Daily Sun for our work in historical preservation.

Through our efforts focused on historical preservation and education, BHS has taken on a role in the community that is unique when compared to other town functions and is important for the growth of the community. Where possible, we will continue to take an active role in being a center for historic discovery and learning about Bartlett, Hart's Location, and Livermore.

On a more somber note, we lost two of our important local members. While we learn of the unfortunate deaths of members throughout the year, these two gentlemen held a special place in our organization. George Howard died at the very end of 2024. George was an ardent supporter of BHS, offered his advice and direction on the running of the organization as requested, and was, himself, a contributor to the history of Bartlett. Norman Head died in February 2025. Norman was one of the founders of BHS in 2026 and served as the president of the organizations until 2018 when he turned the leadership responsibility over to me. Norm was very active in many civic organizations and committees here in Bartlett and beyond and, along with George added to Bartlett's history. We truly miss both of these wonderful men.

In closing, I think it is important to recognize the work of our BHS Board of Directors in their role as the leaders of BHS. Many hours of meetings and follow-up activities go into the running of this organization and we would not be where we are without their dedicated efforts. Similarly, our volunteers help BHS in many different capacities. Their ongoing support takes a huge weight off of the shoulders of the Board. To both the BHS Board of Directors and volunteers, I extend my sincere thanks for their unending support and assistance.

Looking forward to 2026 we will continue our work to discover, preserve and share the history of Bartlett, Hart's Location, and Livermore with all who are interested. We will continue to bring new and interesting exhibits into our museum. We will continue to offer programs for people of all ages and from anywhere to learn about the exciting history of our area. We want to continue to be recognized as a very active and engaging community organization.

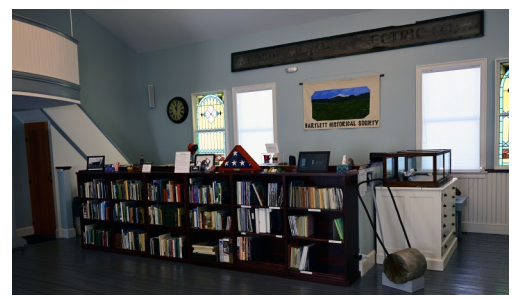
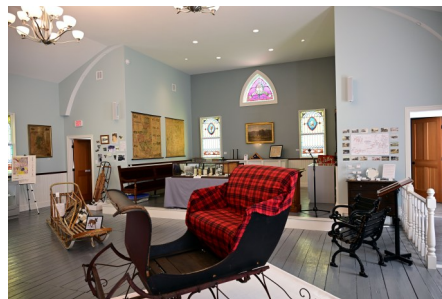

Views of the Bartlett Historical Society Museum

Organizational Overview

Bartlett Historical Society Mission:

- ♦ The collection and preservation of data and items pertaining to the history of Bartlett, Livermore, and Hart's Location, NH
- ♦ Stimulating interest in the history of Bartlett, Livermore, and Hart's Location, NH through the promotion and conducting of educational opportunities and events related to the history of these three towns.

Organizational History

The Bartlett Historical Society was formed in 2006 as a 501 (c) 3 non-profit organization.

Inception of BHS: From its inception, the Bartlett Historical Society gained momentum as a cross section of local people were involved in the organization at the leadership level. Various committees were formed to research and document things such as the different town cemeteries, railroad activity, and military service by townspeople. The Society also established a quarterly presentation series and, in past years, has held an occasional community dinner. All these things were done to help promote the organization and enliven the educational component of the Society's Mission statement. Society business was conducted primarily out of a chalet owned by Story Land but loaned to BHS. Over time, this facility proved to be too small for a BHS business office and museum, so it was relegated to being a storage facility for the organization.

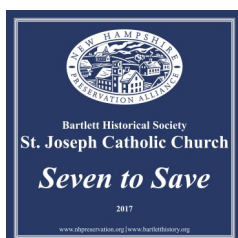
Initial Excitement Loses Energy: Over time, interest in the Historical Society seemed to wane. As this occurred, donations, and membership also began to dwindle. Over the period of 2011 to 2015, membership dropped from a high of just over 150 members to a low, in 2015, of about 70 members with a steadily declining trend. Donations had dropped to nearly zero also.

Revitalization: In 2015, with the addition of some new BHS Board leadership, several things occurred that changed the outlook for BHS. These actions included:

- ♦ Reinstating publication of the quarterly newsletter
- ♦ Activating a fundraising program that included dining benefit events and appeals to membership
- ♦ Raising public awareness to the mission of BHS through public appearances at events such as the Mount Washington Valley Chamber Business Expo and Great Glen Non-Profit Awareness events; also, greater use of advertising and press releases in the Conway Daily Sun to promote BHS events, and
- ♦ Probably the most significant event – the initiation of the project to save, renovate, and reopen the former St. Joseph Church building as the headquarters and museum for the historical society.

Continued Growth: From 2016 – 2024, with the St. Joseph Church renovation project as the central point of attention, the historical society grew membership by an average of 8 – 12% per year, became a point of positive conversation in the broader community, received donations for the renovation project to the tune of \$640,000, and in October 2024, opened the Bartlett Historical Society and Museum as the permanent headquarters and museum for the society.

Recognition: Through the museum project, BHS was recognized by the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance in 2017 with the Seven to Save award for the St. Joseph Church building, in 2018, the St. Joseph Church building was added to the State Register of Historic Places, and in 2025, the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance awarded BHS one of their ten 2025 Preservation Achievement Awards.



Today: The historical trail that BHS is carving continues as the museum building is the central point of activity for the organization. All of the BHS quarterly presentations are performed in this building, the administrative work of the society occurs under this roof, meetings of all sorts occur here, and the museum is a place of learning for all who venture through the front door. The work of the historical society continues as we plan and position the organization for future growth, greater community involvement, and ongoing research into the history of Bartlett, Hart's Location, and Livermore.

Organizational History Conclusion: At the end of 2025, BHS has earned a very positive reputation locally and state-wide for being a well-run organization, true to its Mission, and willing to serve the community in whatever way possible. With a strong leadership team and outstanding volunteers along with a very positive and challenging strategic outlook, BHS looks to continue to be a constructive member of the community.

Community Relations

Constituency

At the broadest level, the Bartlett Historical Society's constituent base is "the general public." We see BHS as a community focused organization. More specifically, we look at our constituents as:

- ◆ Our BHS membership
- ◆ Non-member donors to BHS
- ◆ Members of the public who have an interest in the preservation of local history
- ◆ Members of the public who are interested in learning more about our local history.

As an organization that is open to anyone for either membership, donations, or general interest, we have adopted a non-discrimination policy (see Appendix A).

Current Community Impact

The Bartlett Historical Society is making inroads into our local and regional community as follows:

1. Bartlett History Museum: As noted, the museum is drawing a good deal of attention locally and with visitors to the area. Feedback in person and in our Guest Book show very positive comments. Most visitors spend 45 to 60 minutes in the building looking at the exhibits and talking with staff on hand. The museum is becoming increasingly sought out as a resource service.
2. Expanding BHS Volunteerism: Another positive impact of the museum is our ability to create new volunteering opportunities. As noted in the BHS Board section of the report, we have had several volunteers come forth to help with a variety of tasks. As we open new research topics for exploration and train staff in how to conduct historic research, we hope to expand our list of topics being actively researched. We have continued to use volunteers to handle time-consuming tasks such as preparing our newsletters for mailing, reviewing cemetery records, and cataloging our library books in the museum. As we advance to 2026, we will continue offering ways for people to volunteer in BHS activities.
3. Partnerships with Local Organizations: In 2025, BHS partnered with two organizations and started a partnership with a documentarian. These interactions included:
 - a. Partnership with the Saco Valley Gem and Mineral Club to establish a new Geological History exhibit in the museum.
 - b. We also partnered with the Conway Scenic Railroad as they celebrate the 150th anniversary of the laying of the tracks and first train through Crawford Notch. For this celebration, we added two additional presentations to our schedule, one on the Portland & Ogdensburg Railroad and another on the Maine Central Railroad.
 - c. In December, we met with a gentleman who is developing a documentary on the rebirth of the White Mountain forests after the logging era. Based on our conversation, we expect to be involved in supplying research data for his project and assisting in the editing of his product. This will continue into 2026.

4. **USA 250 Project:** In the last quarter of 2025, BHS President, Phil Franklin, introduced the idea of coordinating a town-wide effort that would culminate in a commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence and formation of the United States of America. Initial steps were taken to begin contacting different constituent organizations to participate in this community event. The target date for the event is July 4, 2026.

All these efforts align with the educational portion of our BHS Mission.

Projected Community Impact

As we venture into 2026, BHS is focused on continuing to have our museum be a central point of interest in the community. We are looking to expand our horizons locally by engaging in new or broadened educational programs. We also will continue our research projects, seeking out individuals or organizations who can assist with data, anecdotes, or artifacts to support research findings. Our efforts include:

1. **BHS/JBES Reengagement:** We are still hoping to reengage with the administration, faculty, and students at the local elementary school. Past efforts to reengage have been met with passive resistance but we will continue to try to reopen the doors of the school to expose the students to the history of our area, their hometown. Small steps will be needed to start
2. **Interaction with the Bartlett Public Library:** As with the elementary school, we continue to attempt to reengage with the trustees of the Bartlett Public Library. BPL has a collection of historical artifacts and documents related to Bartlett history. Our goal is to develop a workable plan to coordinate our efforts to make our local history available to everyone
3. **Expanding Our Research Resources:** We plan to engage with the State Archivist to learn of additional information sources to allow us to expand our historical discovery activities. This will allow BHS to be a stronger community resource for local history
4. **Expanded Educational Offerings:** In 2025, we conducted our first interactive workshop. While we had a small audience, the results and feedback were positive. We will continue to explore opportunities to schedule more of these types of events
5. **USA 250 Project:** We have coined the name “USA 250” for a project that we are planning to coordinate in 2026, the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence and birth of our nation. We are seeking out other community organizations to join with BHS to develop some sort of commemorative event and symbol that recognizes this historic milestone in our nation’s history. Early responses to this idea have been very positive. We are targeting July 4, 2026 as the conclusion of this effort
6. **New BHS Website:** To provide better access to BHS, we are developing a new website that will be current with website design standards plus provide access to the many articles related to local history. These articles will be reviewed, rewritten as necessary, and rechecked for factual accuracy, making updates where needed.
7. **In Conclusion:** We are looking at research projects as a central means of broadening our engagement in the community. We are also using these research projects as a means of continuing and expanding our collection of oral histories received in interviews with people knowledgeable in local historical topics. We also hope that these projects will spark people into being actively engaged in the discovery activities, thereby expanding our community impact and strengthening BHS as a community member.

Taking the concept of more engaged volunteers further, beyond research projects, we envision that volunteers will be able to assist with the running of the museum, becoming ambassadors for the society at promotional events, and/or becoming more involved in the leadership of the organization. Through the museum and attracting different volunteers, we hope to engage younger people in the organization and ensure the longevity of the society.

All these plans and ideas will have a positive impact on the community and help solidify BHS as a forward thinking “citizen” of the Bartlett and regional community.

Membership Report

2025 Membership Drive

Membership in the Bartlett Historical Society is open to anyone with an interest in Bartlett's past, regardless of home location, age, race, gender, religion, personal orientation, or political affiliation. We welcome all new members and appreciate the loyalty and support of our renewing members.

2025 Dues Levels: Our 2025 BHS Membership Drive was opened in December 2024. Membership dues have remained constant for the past several years at the following levels:

General Membership:	\$20
Patron Membership:	\$50
Business Membership:	\$100

Our "membership year" is January 1 through December 31, in line with our fiscal year.

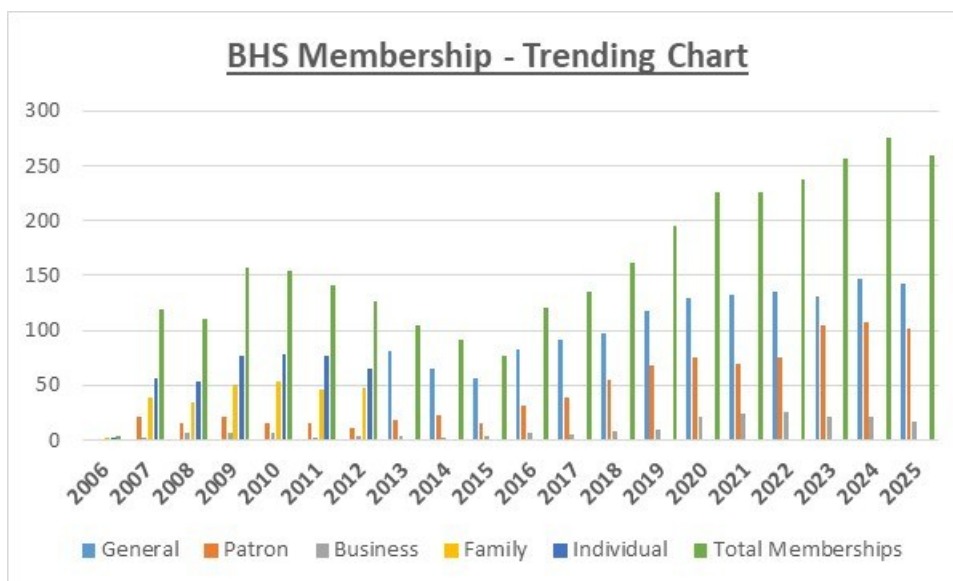
2025 Membership by Level: The 2025 BHS Membership Drive resulted in 260 members. The breakdown of memberships by levels is:

General Membership:	142	(2024 was 147)
Patron Membership:	100	(2024 was 108)
Business Membership:	17	(2024 was 19)
Lifetime Membership:	1	(awarded to members based on BoD decision)

Overall, the 2025 membership numbers show a decrease of 15 members from 2024. Through the year, we learned of several members who died in 2025. This explains some of the decrease in membership. Others who did not renew could be attributed to general attrition that happens with all non-profit organizations.

While it is early in our 2026 Membership Drive, we have already had 211 memberships taken with BHS since the start of the 2026 campaign in December 2025. This is 81 memberships ahead of our 2025 number at this time in 2025.

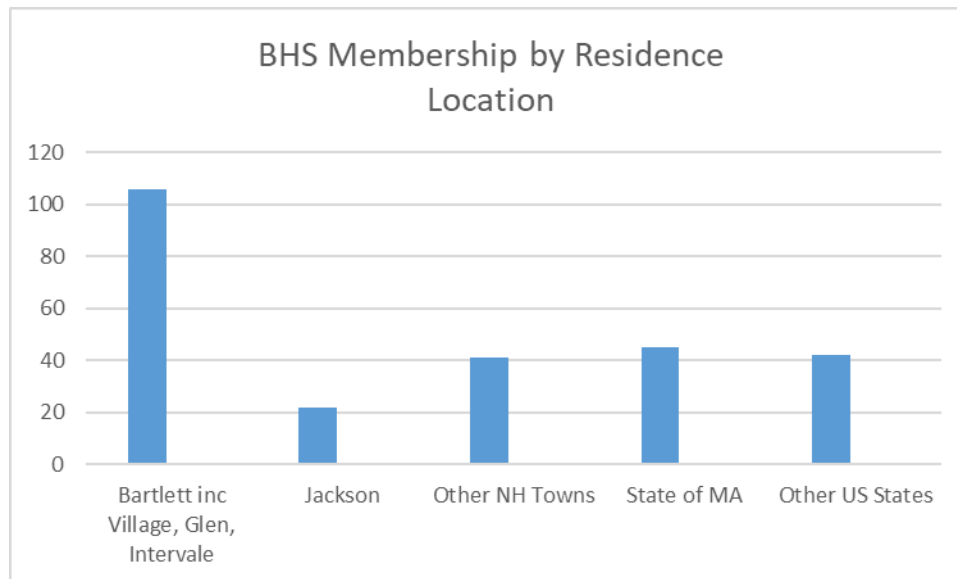
Sustaining and Expanding Membership: We are searching for ways to reach out beyond our existing "bubble" of members to seek additional membership support. Ideas include a press release in the Conway Daily Sun, incentives at workshops for "free" admission with a membership, and meeting with other civic groups in the area. We will continue to look for new ways to encourage people who are not already members to join BHS.



Note: From 2006 – 2012, BHS had two different membership categories, "Family" and "Individual," that were replaced by "General" in 2013.

Membership Geographic Dispersion

BHS membership in 2025 was concentrated within the towns of Bartlett and Hart's Location (41% of members) with the remaining members scattered across New Hampshire and several others across the country. Another concentration of members is from Massachusetts with 18% of our membership hailing from that state. This is predominantly because Bartlett has many second homeowners from Massachusetts. Other states represented in our 2025 membership roster include CA, CT, DE, FL, IL, MD, ME, NC, NJ, PA, RI, TX, VA, UT, VT, and WA.

Future Considerations Regarding Membership

Our members are our most important constituents. We are continually looking for ways to invite more people to join and sustain their membership in the historical society. Many factors cause people to join BHS or, conversely, drop their BHS membership. In trying to understand these factors, the BHS Board has several challenges as we look at our strategy for membership retention and attraction of new members. It is worth noting that the points below are common to all our neighboring local historical societies. One of the common reasons for a person's membership being dropped is their death. In 2025, several members passed away. Many of our members are older and, unfortunately, dying is an unavoidable part of living.

Some of the things we should continue to explore include:

- ⇒ How to engage younger people and even students in the historical society
- ⇒ What are the motivations and expectations of people who are joining the historical society
- ⇒ What are the motivations and expectations of members who have retained their memberships
- ⇒ Why do members drop their BHS membership
- ⇒ What types of programs we can offer to attract and retain people "from away" as BHS members
- ⇒ Additionally, for people outside the Bartlett area, how can we engage them in BHS to make their membership "meaningful"

With 59% of our members from other states or other locations in NH, we will continue to actively explore methods that will allow these members to participate in BHS activities and see what BHS is doing. We will be able to provide a location for people to come and experience the history of the three towns we cover. For those unable to join us in person, we plan to offer expanded online access to the museum and broaden our social media platform including supporting a Bartlett Historical Society (NH) YouTube channel. This will hopefully provide alternative inducements for people to join the society. We'll have more to report on this development in our 2026 Annual Report.

Volunteer Program

With the opening of our BHS museum, we have started a meaningful volunteer program. Volunteers have provided support by covering museum hours, assisting in research projects, moving BHS collections and property, and administrative tasks. Their support has been extremely helpful as they have provided valuable, time-saving contributions to the Historical Society.

Our volunteers not only take a lot of the day-to-day workload off the BHS Board but also add to the community spirit of the organization.

In addition to the volunteers listed above, the BHS Board of Directors also contributes their time to the management and leadership of the Historical Society. Board members meet monthly to discuss and manage the business aspects of BHS. Board members also contribute a considerable amount of time to a variety of tasks including managing and maintaining the museum during “open” hours, doing BHS banking, BHS collection management, organizing and executing fundraising events, addressing member and public questions and inquiries, BHS marketing and publications, conducting historical research, and many more tasks that keep this organization active in the community.

In total, BHS recorded 2,014 volunteer hours for the Board and additional volunteers. This number is most definitely lower than the total hours contributed to the organization as several Board members such as the President, Curator, and Treasurer do not often record hours contributed when working at home, outside the museum for BHS, or at the museum during off hours.

As we move into 2026, we hope to find ways to expand our volunteer program as well as attract new volunteers to assist in current activities. These volunteers will help the organization continue to move forward as a member of the Bartlett community.

Curator's Report

Museum

For the opening of the Museum, displays were set up using previously cataloged materials and arranged by subjects such as Schools, Kearsarge Peg Mill, Livermore, National Forest, CCC, Railroads, Hotels, Churches, Lumber Industry, Retail Stores, and Hart's Location. These initial displays were created to give a "feel" for the materials in the current Museum collection. Over 100 items and photos were on display from October 2024 through June 2025.

Displays were changed in late June 2025 with a "reveal" at the Museum open house on July 4th. The new displays featured a geological history display including rocks and minerals loaned or donated by the Saco Valley Gem and Mineral Club along with rock hunting tools. A display case was dedicated to hotel information highlighting the Barron & Merrill hotel chain and also included a bound copy of "The Echo" newspaper which published hotel registration guest lists in the late 1890s. This past summer, the Bartlett Historical Society partnered with the Conway Scenic Railroad to highlight the 150th anniversary of the first train through Crawford Notch. Photos, prints, and artifacts were displayed that related to the history of railroads in the Mount Washington Valley with an additional display case dedicated to the history of the Conway Scenic Railroad. The Military display was also expanded and updated during this time period to feature items from the late 18th century up through the Iraqi freedom campaign. This June-December 2025 Display featured an additional 100+ items from the Museum Collection.

In early January 2026, the Museum was closed to facilitate the changeover to new displays scheduled for a January 2026 launch. This theme, for the first half of 2026, will emphasize all aspects of "Winter in the Valley".

After completing a full year of recording visitor activity, we are proud to report that over 350 people have visited the Museum since the opening in October 2024. This figure represents visitor activity during normal business hours and does not include visitors attending presentations or special events such as the open house on July 4th and the book sale on Columbus Day weekend

Materials

Cataloging the large backlog of materials previously donated as well as new donations continues. 2025 donations included genealogical information on the Mead families, rocks/minerals from the Saco Valley Gem and Mineral club, numerous railroad history items, deeds and property histories, additions to our military collection of World War II items and photos of people and places important to Bartlett history.

The Bartlett Historical Society uses the PastPerfect database to track and inventory items donated or collected. This database allows us to catalog items by category and to maintain comprehensive donation and membership records as well as providing us with the means to maintain a "People Biographies" database consisting of historical biographical records for Bartlett, Livermore, and Hart's Location residents.

The current BHS collection consists of 149 cataloged "Objects." These objects consist of household objects (i.e., dishes, linens, etc.), toys (dolls), manufacturing artifacts (i.e., wooden pegs), posters, souvenirs, transportation items (i.e., railroad spikes) and many other miscellaneous items.

The "Archives" portion of the database consists of various papers and documents collected or donated. Local newspapers are searched for any relevant articles, advertisements, obituaries, etc. related to Bartlett and these articles are clipped and stored in folders in the archives collection. Currently there are 260 specific folders containing articles and miscellanea related to various Bartlett subjects. In addition, there are another 256 individually cataloged documents in the Archives collection.

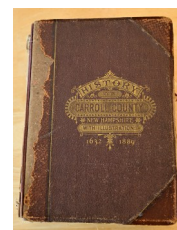
The BHS "Photographs" collection contains 152 cataloged photographs. Cataloging continues on the backlog of donated photos and will commence on an extensive collection of photos currently on hard drives. The BHS also has a large postcard collection which is currently not cataloged. Sorting of postcards

has begun with plans to catalog each postcard and, eventually, scan the image adding to the “Photographs” section of our database. As postcards are sorted, those items not related to Bartlett or the surrounding area have been offered for sale resulting in over \$200 additional income to the General Fund.

The “Library” portion of the BHS collection currently consists of 461 cataloged books and journal titles. Notes relevant to Bartlett have been added to records where appropriate and will help in research, eliminating the need to scan the contents and indexes of each item.

Restoration/Preservation

In 2025, we had three historically significant items from our museum restored and preserved by the Green Dragon Bindery in Shrewsbury, MA. These items, an original History of Carroll County: 1632—1889; an 1890 Carroll County wall map; and a hand drawn copy of a 1795 Hart’s Location map dated to about 1830, are now back on display in our museum. Green Dragon is a highly recommended restoration shop.

Genealogy

We now have more than 10,300 biographical entries in the PastPerfect database. These simple biographies have been added or updated through research into the Town of Bartlett vital statistics records, Ancestry.com and information found at the website Findagrave.com.

A new project was begun in 2022 to research names which appear on the US Census reports. Census information is currently being added to existing People biographies. New records for individuals not currently listed in PastPerfect will be added as information is researched in Ancestry.com.

Along with the “People Biographies” in the PastPerfect database, we also maintain a cemetery index in an Excel spreadsheet. This index to Bartlett gravesites now contains information on over 1,800 individuals and is periodically updated by comparison with information available on the Findagrave website with the last update in 2024. The recent addition to our collection of a cemetery index prepared in the late 1990s is helping to update our records. A comparison of this document with our current records will continue.

In 2025, Bartlett Historical Society upgraded their membership to Ancestry.com. The upgraded membership includes additional access to newspaper records (newspapers.com) and military records (Fold3) as well as access to international biographical information.

PastPerfect Database

Data conversion needed to create an online version of PastPerfect was completed in April 2025. We are currently working with the designer of our new website to eventually integrate the PastPerfect database into our website allowing any user to search all of our collections online by late 2026.

Plans are being made to photograph all cataloged objects and artifacts and to scan the images into the PastPerfect database. We will also begin scanning images of all cataloged photos in our collection. This will allow users to “see” their search results from wherever they access the database.

Future

Once again, we ask your help in donating items of history to the collection. Every effort is made to treat your donations with the respect and care that they deserve. The Bartlett Historical Society Museum now provides much needed space to preserve and display what the Society currently owns and will also provide a “home” to any items donated in the future. We look forward to the coming year as a productive one with continuing organization, research and storage of the current collection and any future additions.

Financial Report

The Bartlett Historical Society is on solid financial ground as we end 2025. In 2025, the BHS Board of Directors approved three significant initiatives that changed the fiscal management of the organization.

- ◆ Closing the BHS Museum Renovation account; in the process, remaining museum renovation funds were combined with the general BHS operational funds
- ◆ Defined four distinct categories for the allocation of funds under BHS management
- ◆ Engaged our accounting firm, Leone, McDonnell & Roberts, PA, to conduct a Review of our 2024 books.

With these three steps, the BHS Board is positioned to move forward confidently with a new post-renovation fiscal management plan.

Notes Related to the Three Financial Initiatives

- Combining the Museum Account into the Operational Account: With the renovation of the museum and headquarters building completed in 2024, our Museum Renovation Account no longer had a purpose. Funds remaining from the museum renovation were combined into the BHS Operational Account. Along with this action, we closed our Operational Account at TD Bank, establishing a single combined account at Northway Savings Bank (now Camden National Bank).
- Definition of Fund Categories: To establish a more defined approach to managing our funds, the BHS Board created the following sub-categories for the funds under our care at the beginning of March 2025:
 - ◇ Operational Fund (50% of the March 2025 assets): Designed to cover the basic operational expenses for the Historical Society (e.g., propane, electric, water bills, insurance premiums, office supplies, standard building maintenance, etc.)
 - ◇ Maintenance Reserve (30% of the March 2025 assets): Funds for major repairs or improvements to the BHS museum and headquarters building (e.g., roof repair or replacement, septic repair or replacement, basement flooding damage, etc.)
 - ◇ Collections and Preservation Reserve (10% of the March 2025 assets): This reserve is designed to provide funding for the purchase of historically relevant artifacts or restoration of artifacts)
 - ◇ Endowment Fund (10% of the March 2025 assets): This fund is designed to provide funding for the long-term financial stability of BHS.
- Review of 2024 Financial Books: A formal Review of our 2024 books showed that we have managed our finances appropriately. Minor adjustments were recommended in our QuickBooks processing.

BHS Board of Directors Financial Oversight: The BHS Board of Directors meets once a month. A standard agenda item for the meeting is a review of the Treasurer's Report. This report contains a summary statement followed by the details of a Profit & Loss Statement as well as Balance sheet. These detailed reports provide a monthly accounting of the past month's financial activities, a year to date view plus a comparison to the previous year's activities.

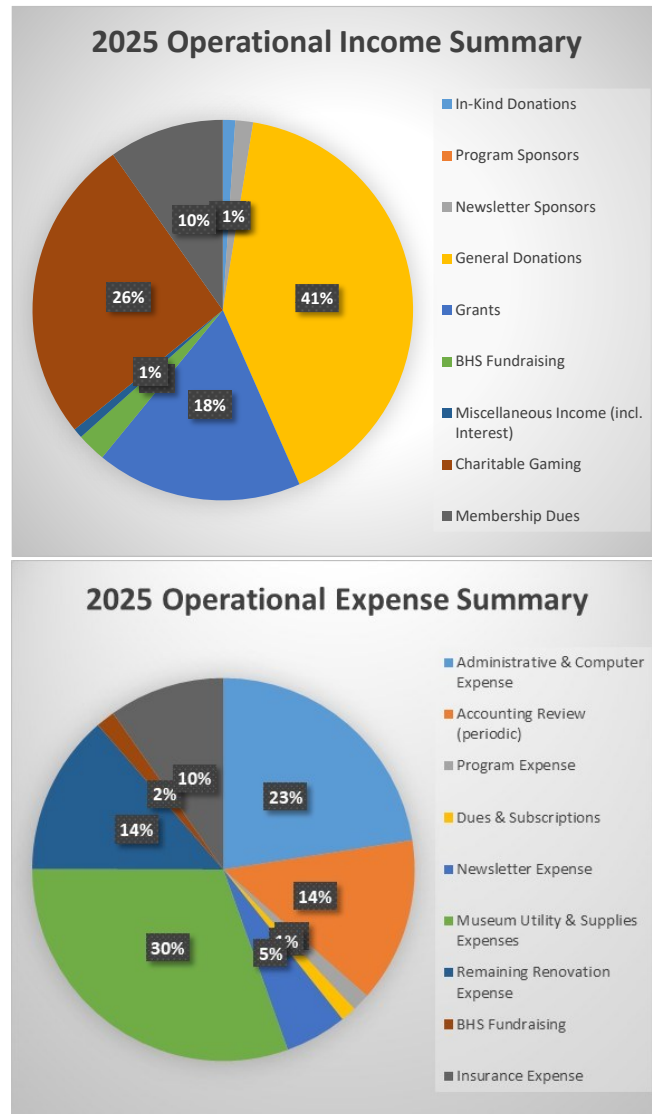
While standard expenses are payable at the discretion of the Treasurer, large or unusual expense items are discussed at the Board level to reach a decision to make a purchase or not.

Similarly, movement of funds into or out of investment vehicles (generally money market and CD accounts) is also discussed and movement of funds (or not) is made only after the Board agreement.

The Treasurer is also responsible for presenting an annual budget for the organization. This budget is reviewed in January of each year. After Board review, adjustments are made and a final budget for the fiscal year is approved.

The BHS Operational Account covers all income and expenses for the Historical Society.

Income Notes

As a non-profit organization, BHS income is derived from membership dues, donations, fundraising, and grants. BHS does not receive or solicit for any local, state, or federal funds. Dues for renewal or new memberships). It is important to note that while we received a donation from a charitable gaming source in 2025, this is not a standard source of income and is not a budgeted income item. Charitable gaming donations are received only when a local casino selects BHS as a sponsored non-profit.

Expense Notes

Similar to any other business, BHS incurs a variety of expenses. In 2025, our top four expense categories were Museum Utility and Supplies (i.e., 31% of our 2025 expenses: Propane, electricity, water expenses, museum supplies, restoration services); Administrative and Computer expenses (i.e., 23% of our 2025 expenses: Office and technology supplies, computer software subscriptions); Accounting Review (i.e., 14% of our 2025 expenses: A one time charge for a CPA Review of our 2024 books – this expense will be seen every two to three years); Remaining Renovation Expenses (i.e., 14% of our 2025 expenses: Due to contractor availability, some punch list items were deferred until after the museum opened; in the future, these items will be paid out of the Maintenance Reserve). In general, we have tried to minimize expenses for the organization and building but inflation continues to drive up the prices on most of the things we need for normal business operations.

2025 BHS Objectives

Our work toward meeting our objectives for 2025 again showed mixed results but all of the objectives set forth showed progress toward completion of the goal. The 2025 Objectives and Results are below:

- ◆ Broaden Access to the Bartlett Historical Society: Implement online PastPerfect, engage in a second social media platform, establish a BHS YouTube channel
 - ⇒ Result: This objective was partially met. Progress has been made toward the implementation of the online PastPerfect as the software has been purchased, conversion of the single user data to the online version has been completed, and a review of that data for conversion accuracy is underway. The BHS YouTube channel has been established but we are searching for editing expertise so we can upload videos. We are working on the steps to implement a new BHS website that is linked with online PastPerfect
- ◆ Build an Effective BHS Volunteer Program: Identify volunteer opportunities, build a training program, develop a volunteer recognition program
 - ⇒ Results: We have engaged several volunteers in different aspects of the operations for BHS as well as working in the museum; this will be an ongoing objective designed to continually build the BHS Volunteer Program
- ◆ Activate a Historical Research Program: Add to our list of topics needing further research, develop a training program for research assistants, create a repository for completed research project documentation
 - ⇒ Result: Research project have been initiated and are in progress. Through this effort, we are discovering new sources of historic information and are beginning to train volunteers in simple research techniques
- ◆ Network with Other Historical Societies and Non-Profits: Reengage the meeting of regional historical societies, participate in a state wide summit involving non-profits, institute a local history program with the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School, engage with the Bartlett Public Library in a cross support program for local history, develop stronger ties with the leadership of Bartlett and Hart's Location
 - ⇒ Result: This objective was partially met. BHS engaged in a program being run by the Museum of the White Mountains titled "Know thy Neighbor" where non-profits from northern New Hampshire gathered to discuss common non-profit issues and work to solutions. Unfortunately, this program was cancelled due to federal budget cuts. BHS has not initiated a revived local historical society networking effort. Attempts to reengage with the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School and Bartlett Public Library have been unsuccessful. BHS leadership will continue to try to reestablish these connections
- ◆ Strengthen Our BHS Operational Procedures and Practices: Continue development of BHS Policies and Practices documentation.
 - ⇒ Result: We continue to work on our operational policies and practices. Again, this is a long term objective.

Organizational Affiliations

The Bartlett Historical Society is aligned with civic, historic preservation, or non-profit support organizations. Each affiliation has a specific purpose from which BHS derives a benefit. For example, through our affiliation with the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance, we were offered sound advice on how we should proceed with our museum renovation activities. Post renovation engagement with NHPA has seen a continued dialog on preservation steps and advice. The Mount Washington Valley Promotions organization run by Lisa DuFault from Bartlett is a great support in getting announcements of our programs out to the public plus has offered BHS television spots to allow us to promote our museum effort. Other organizations such as the New Hampshire Center for Non-Profits offers online webinars and seminars covering topics such as how to promote our organization.

Each year, as memberships come up for renewal, the BHS Board of Directors evaluates the support provided by the affiliated organizations, the cost of membership and benefit we perceive we are receiving through that membership. A conscious decision is made on whether to renew with the affiliation or non-renew our membership.
